

### Jason Lewis, Greenbrae Lanes and Marin Nostalgia

What is MarinNostalgia.org? Launched in 2006 by lifelong resident and Marin County Realtor Jason Lewis, (Redwood '87) MarinNostalgia is a virtual time machine. His passion for historical sidelights knows no bounds. He became interested in the more recent history of Marin that wasn't easy to find. (50's to 90's) His curiosity got the best of him when someone pointed out a place where there was once a bowling alley and he started a search to find a photo.



Work started on the much-anticipated 24-lane bowling alley, called Greenbrae Lanes, in the summer of 1958. Up to that point, only one other bowling alley existed in San Rafael...An even larger 30 lane alley was set to be built in Ignacio, called Nave Lanes. The Independent Journal reported that when completed, the combined alleys...will help solve one of Marin's biggest what-to-do-after-sundown-besides-watch-TV situation that the whole family can enjoy."

Greenbrae Lanes opened on March 6, 1959. The blue-roofed bowling alley was open 24 hours a day and soon featured a coffee shop, tavern and childcare nursery. Seeing that bowling up until then had largely been a man's sport, assistant manager Ron Gurries took on the task of recruiting families to come bowl and form leagues. He started an instruction program for children and women and assisted in the creation of housewives' leagues...The bowling alley remained in business into the 1970's, but was closed as business waned. The area was redeveloped into Drakes Landing; Jason's Restaurant now sits on the approximate location of the bowling alley. (In the Heart of Marin p. 276-277)

Lewis has worked in many different professions, but being a historian was never even a thought. The job opportunity presented itself through his work as a Frank Howard Allen agent. "When I started, I only knew

so much about local real estate, so I thought it'd be interesting to learn about local history for when I show clients around," he says. Most of this history is stored in boxes in local garages... maybe even your garage!

Marin Nostalgia became a website and a Facebook page, with contributions from all over the county. There are many photos arranged by topics such as clubs, people, bands and cities. For many of us, it is our history. "Don't throw away your old of boxes of photos, because if you do, a little piece of Marin history could be lost forever."



# Kicking "Roofers" and Other Great Memories of Greenbrae School

Historical Reflections of the Kentfield School District Caren Choppelas Horstmeyer Kent '74

Ever kick a "roofer"? Player kickball and striving for roofers was the first topic that came up in a recent reminiscing session I had with Greenbrae alumnae. In those days we picked our own teams, made our own rules, and played kickball at lunch and recess. We used to love getting the perfect pitch for a roofer. We lived for it. When the right pitch came we'd kick as hard as we could and launch the ball up and over the opposing team in the outfield near the sixth grade classrooms...

Hot dog days were the best! Twenty five-cent hotdogs, and five cents for a cupcake. We bought tickets from the PTA women on the way to the multi-purpose room. They had cardboard trays for us that included the chips, orange soda, hotdogs and cupcakes. You didn't have to bring your lunch. It was great!

There was tetherball, two and four-square, and handball. We can't forget the Swiss cheese wall. We loved climbing over, under and through the holes, even though it was really for the younger kids. We had Hat Day, Green and White Day and Kite Day...There were many different eventsmost memorable being the wheelbarrow races.

Greenbrae School was a great place not only during school, but after school and on the weekends. It was more than a school; it was also a place where we played outdoors from morning to night and on the weekends- where friendships and a wonderful sense of community developed. There was nothing like sliding down the sloped hills to the school on a collapsed cardboard box. We called it cardboard sliding. Each time, we hoped never to step on or encounter a snake while getting in position to slide. Years later, someone dared to build houses on our sacred cardboard sliding hill...

We certainly can't forget
Halloween Parades. Every year
on Halloween we would go in
costume and parade up Eliseo to
Greenbrae School, where they
gave prizes for the best costume
and handed out hotdogs and
cupcakes for everyone. It was
very popular and everyone in
the neighborhood participated
with homemade costumes...

Today, all that remains are the big huge trees that lined the field and courts, and the one lone basketball court. One thing I'm sure of: "Once a Greenbrae Schooler, always a Greenbrae Schooler!"
